

# SIXTH FORM DRESS CODE

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## Boys Dress Code:

### **Suits:**

Boys are expected to wear either a two or three piece suit. **This should be cut in a traditional manner** and be dark blue, black, charcoal or dark brown in colour. A light pin stripe is acceptable, as is cord or 'moleskin' material as long as they are conservative in style. 'Skinny' suits or 'two tone' suits are not acceptable nor are suits coloured in an ostentatious style.

### **Shoes:**

Shoes should be leather and be of a single colour (black or brown). These can be either slip on or laced up. Boots are not acceptable.

### **Shirts:**

Shirts should be in a 'business' style and can be coloured, striped or checked. Buttoned down collars, plaid style or cutaway collars are all prohibited.

### **Jumpers:**

Woollen jumpers are acceptable but must be v-necked and a single colour. Patterned jumpers are not acceptable. Hoodies and sweatshirts are also prohibited.

### **Ties:**

Sixth Form students are allowed to wear their own ties although there will be occasions when House or Prefect ties are expected to be worn (whole school events). Novelty ties of any sort are prohibited.

### **Coats:**

These should be a single colour (dark brown, dark blue, black, tan or charcoal) and of a traditional 'overcoat' style. They can be cut either in a long, medium or short style. Raincoats must also be of a conservative colour (black, dark blue, dark brown, tan or charcoal). Sports coats or 'jackets' of any sort are prohibited, as are logos.

### **Jewellery & Accessories:**

Boys are allowed to wear a single ring and a single bracelet. Earrings or any other visible piercings are prohibited. Any belt buckles must be conservative in style. Students can wear woollen scarves during the winter months, but these must be taken off when in lessons.

### **Hair:**

Hair should be of a conservative style and equal length all over. Mohicans, 'train tracks', Mohawks or any similar cuts are prohibited. Hair should be of a 'natural' colour and a single tone.

The dress code for boys requires a modicum of common sense. **Those students who deliberately flout either the word or the spirit of the dress code will be asked to go home and return when properly dressed. The school reserves the right to decide whether this is the case.**

## ***Girls Dress Code:***

### ***Suits:***

Girls are expected to wear a suit. This can either be a trouser suit or a skirt suit. **The jacket and trousers/skirt must be matching.** Skirts must be of a respectable length and should not be made from stretchy or clinging material. Suits should be conservative in style and colour (dark blue, dark brown, black or charcoal) and tailored in a traditional fashion. A light pinstripe or other similar feature in the material is acceptable. Tailored dresses with jackets are acceptable.

### ***Shirts/Blouses:***

Girls can wear a shirt or blouse of their choice. This should be of a single colour and loose fitting.

### ***Shoes:***

Girls should wear leather shoes of a single colour. Stiletto heels are prohibited as are Ugg or similar style boots. Any shoe should not go above the ankle.

### ***Coats:***

These should be a single colour (dark brown, dark blue, black, tan or charcoal) and of a traditional 'overcoat' style. They can be cut either in a long, medium or short style. Raincoats must also be of a conservative colour (black, dark blue, dark brown, tan or charcoal). Sports coats or 'jackets' of any sort are prohibited, as are logos.

### ***Jewellery & Accessories:***

Girls are allowed a single ring, a single bracelet, one pair of earrings and a single necklace. A single nose ring or piercing is acceptable but piercings of any other nature are prohibited.

### ***Hair:***

Hair is expected to be worn in a conservative style and be a single colour. Dyed hair is prohibited.

Girls are expected to present themselves in a dignified and businesslike fashion. **Those students who deliberately flout either the word or the spirit of the dress code will be asked to go home and return when properly dressed. The school reserves the right to decide whether this is the case.**
